

NSW Street Rod Committee Inc. Procedure for Conditional Registration of Street Rods

The NSW Street rod Committee Inc. (NSW SRC) has the responsibility (delegated by the RTA) to partially administer Conditional Registration of Street Rods in NSW. The NSW SRC reserves the right to refuse to accept any vehicle it considers unsafe or unsuitable. To gain Conditional Registration of Street Rods in NSW, the following procedure applies:

- a) To be eligible for the scheme the owner must be a member of an ASRF affiliated club; or a Street Rod Club approved by the NSW Street Rod Committee Inc. You will require a declaration form signed by the club secretary confirming that you are a member of that club.
- b) You must have the vehicle assessed by an RTA Authorised Engineering Signatory and a comprehensive written report provided in accordance with the guidance on this site. Photographs may be necessary to explain some modifications. The report must be available to the NSW SRC authorised inspector when the vehicle is presented for their inspection.
- c) An Application/Declaration form must be completed and signed by the owner. The Application/Declaration form provides the Committee with details of the owner and a description of the vehicle.
- d) The completed Street Rod must be presented to the Authorised NSW Street Rod Committee inspector at Wye NSW. A fee applies ([See fees](#)).
- e) For remote locations the NSW SRC employs agents. Vehicles inspected by agents must have a back-up inspection by the Authorised NSW Street Rod Committee inspector at Wye NSW within three (3) months after registration is obtained.
- f) A signed inspection form and photographs will form the record of the inspection.
- g) A vehicle identification plate is permanently affixed to the Street Rod chassis.
- h) Once all this has been completed, you can pay your initial registration fee to the NSW SRC. This covers the inspection, CTP insurance and registration. The NSW SRC lodges the application on your behalf to register the vehicle. The RTA will supply the plates and sticker to the NSW SRC.
- i) Once processed, you will receive your Plates, registration sticker, CTP insurance, registration and Travelling Authority Card via post from the NSW SRC. Allow up to 14 days for this process.
- j) Then the vehicle may be driven on the public roads throughout Australia provided you have a traveling authority (permit) number and it is properly logged in your Traveling Authority Card and in the authorised person's log book.

All Conditionally Registered Street Rods have a common expiry date of 31 March each year, regardless of the first month registered. Renewal notices are sent to owners by the RTA. You must then have the car inspected at a NSW SRC authorised inspection station (Pink Slip). The Traveling Authority Card is issued annually by the Committee, and **must** be returned to the Committee when you renew your registration in March each year. A renewal fee applies A fee applies ([See fees](#)).

Conditional Registration of Street Rods in NSW is not transferable, and plates must be returned to the RTA if a vehicle is sold or destroyed. When the vehicle is presented by the new owner, it must comply with whatever regulations are in force at that point in time.
